# 2. UPDATE EMCOG LISTENING SESSIONS AS PART OF THE DEVELOPMENT OF AN ECONOMIC RECOVERY STRATEGY FOR THE REGION – Jane Fitzpatrick

Beginning at the end of this past December, I began holding listening sessions (either through zoom meetings or phone calls) with the RED Team and other partners in the Region in order for to engage with me on a one-by-one basis to hear insights and thoughts for the development of an addendum to the EMCOG 2021-2025 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) focusing on Sustainability, Equity and Resiliency. It is our intent that this regional economic recovery strategy will provide a clear nexus between COVID-19 response and the recent (2020) catastrophic infrastructure failures suffered after heavy rains caused flooding damage through 5 of our 14 counties including the collapse of

infrastructure (dams and roads). This type of approach speaks to the need to facilitate development of any economic recovery strategy by also analyzing the need for integrated asset management and hazard mitigation planning. **To date I have held 72 sessions.** As noted during these sessions, I take notes for preparation of a report. I am not soliciting for more sessions at this point but if you would like to talk with me or know of someone who would be a good resource please contact me. I will be preparing a report for the RED Team review and basis for development the strategies and action items in the regional economic recovery strategy. # 3. **UPDATE** DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE EDA GRANTS STATUS – Jane Fitzpatrick

We are waiting for further word from EDA on the status of grant applications submitted over the past few months. There has been what I would say an over-whelming number of applications submitted from all regions of the country. The deadline for the EDA ARPA grant opportunities have passed. However, the deadline for the EDA regular grant opportunities for this fiscal year is a rolling deadline. That being said, due to the high number of grant applications that were submitted for the EDA ARPA funding opportunities, it is possible that grants that were not funded due to applications determined to be competitive greatly exceeding available funding, some/many competitive grants may have been "rolled" over into the regular funding opportunities. If you are considering applying for funding this fiscal year through the regular EDA grant opportunities I suggest you get your application in as soon as possible as there may be a long line of competitive grant applications in front of you. The grant rate this year is 80/20. It is unknown if this rate will continue next year. All pending applicants that I am aware of have been notified. Please share this with anyone you are aware of that I am not.

# 4. REMINDER EMCOG EDA CARES ACT 14 COUNTY REVOLVING LOAN FUND – Jane Fitzpatrick

EMCOG received funding in July, 2020 from the U.S. Department of Commerce EDA to establish a 14-County Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) through the CARES Act. The allocation to EMCOG included approximately \$500,000 for lending for projects which promote business revitalization and growth, enhance workplace safety, strengthen supply chains and sustain and/or create jobs.



## 8. FROM MARCH REPORT: Labor Market Trends - Cynthia Edwards

The total number of establishments in the EMCOG 14-County Region in the  $1^{st}$  Quarter was 17,073 and experienced an increase of 150 establishments by the  $2^{nd}$  Quarter at 17,223. The number of people employed has also increased from 241,581 in the  $1^{st}$  Quarter and 252,301 in the  $2^{nd}$  Quarter, showing an increase of approximately 10,720. The employment gains within the region went from -3.7% in the  $1^{st}$  Quarter to +7.2% in the  $2^{nd}$  Quarter and the weekly wages increased by +4.3% in the  $1^{st}$  Quarter compared to +1.3% within the  $2^{nd}$  Quarter.

The increase in establishments, employment and weekly wages in the 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter compared to the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter shows that the region as whole is beginning to grow amid the pandemic. It is suggested that the numbers will continue to increase as things shift back to "normal" and given that many establishments are now adapting to remote work, the pandemic can

be expected to be less of an issue within the labor force as these transitions are being made. According to Pew Research, during the COVID-19 recession the labor market can also be accompanied by the increase of 55+ adults retiring earlier and giving an assumption that the younger adults will continue to gradually enter the labor force. Many younger adults have returned to school remotely to accomplish these goals of retaining jobs.
